GLENBRANTER

Orienteering is all about finding your way around using a map. The permanent course markers are wooden posts with a distinctive red & white symbol; there is also a number and code letters on the post.

At Glenbranter you can choose to do an easy course (this is recommended if you have never tried orienteering before so that you can get used to the map) or try a harder course with lots of climb! You can also make up your own route round the control posts.

What to do

You will need to take a pen or pencil with you so that you can copy down the code letters.

The Start and Finish is at the Forestry Commission Office and is marked on the map with a red triangle.

You use the information shown on the map to plan your route between the control posts.

The points to be visited are shown by the centre of each red circle on the map. When you find the control post, check the number and then copy the code letters into the appropriate box on your course sheet.

Getting all the letters right shows that you have been successful.
